King Charles' Personal Rule, 1629-40. After the assassination of the Duke of Buckingham and the dissolution of the 1629 Parliament, King Charles resolved never to call a Parliament again. The eleven-year period of the King's Personal Rule (1629-40) was described by his enemies as the "Eleven Year Tyranny".

The Personal Rule of Charles I. The King was weakened in this war because many of his English subjects sympathised with the Scots in their opposition to his religious policies. In June 1639 an uneasy truce was called. Charles, knowing that he needed money for the inevitable renewal of war, reluctantly summoned a Parliament for April 1640.
