Homo heidelbergensis: Homo heidelbergensis, extinct species of archaic human known from fossils dating from 600,000 to 200,000 years ago in Africa, Europe, and possibly Asia. The name first appeared in print in 1908 to accommodate an ancient human jaw discovered in 1907 near the town of Mauer, southeast of Heidelberg, Germany.

50,000BC to 30,000BC is the "Garden of Eden Period" for modern Homo Sapiens. In north west Africa and Near East, as Homo Sapiens swamped and replaced older and more archaic subspecies of Homo and inherited the earth. Shreeve in his book on Neandertals suggests that about 48,000BC, the world population of Homo sapiens plus Neandertals might be about 1.3 million, in "Eurasia".
